Prior to coming here, Andre had been successful in Haiti working as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and running a small transportation business, but the political instability made him worry about his kids and their future. Like so many other immigrants, he made the decision to start over in the United States for the sake of his children.

He remembers The ILC very fondly, saying "It was so great for me. Everybody was like family. When I first came, the students and teachers were my only friends."

After learning English, Andre earned his commercial driver's license and has been working as a truck driver ever since. It's a good job that allows him to support his family here and relatives in Haiti.

His daughter is in high school, and his son starts his first year of college in the fall. Andre's dream is that one day it will be his turn to go back to school so he can work as an EMT again.
