Diane Portnoy shared her story about coming to America as a child and how seeing her parents and their friends struggle to make a new life motivated her to start The ILC. Other welcoming remarks were given by Malden Mayor Gary Christenson and keynote speaker Nereyda Garcia of Biogen Idec.

Family and friends looked on with pride as their loved ones from Albania to Vietnam took the Oath of Allegiance with American flags in hand. They and their children are gifts to this country.

Your contributions are magnified through the Low Literacy Sharing Circle Immigrants with literacy challenges across Eastern Massachusetts are helped by this new program

It's hard enough to learn to speak, read and write in a new language as an adult in a foreign country. It can seem nearly impossible for students who, for reasons ranging from poverty to war, religious restrictions or learning disabilities, never learned to read and write in their first language.

These students who are often left behind in traditional classes learn to read, write and speak English in The Immigrant Learning Center's innovative Literacy Program. Your support has helped thousands of these vulnerable students. To help other educators meet similar challenges, our Literacy instructors have written articles and delivered workshops, yet it still seemed like they were barely able to scratch the surface of the need.

To make an even bigger impact, the director of The ILC Literacy Program, Kathleen Klose, launched a Low Literacy Sharing Circle on October 2, 2014. So far, nearly 50 educators from across Eastern Massachusetts have signed up to share ideas, resources and mentoring.

The generosity of ILC supporters brings hope to this particularly vulnerable group of newcomers. Thanks to the new Sharing Circle, that hope will now ripple through to touch the lives of many more immigrants in Massachusetts.

ILC student shines in Window Arts Malden

ILC student Minghuang Zhang from China was chosen to be one of 23 local artists whose works were displayed throughout the city as part of the ninth annual *Window Arts Malden* from September 21 through October 12, 2014. Minghuan's extraordinary, colorful portraits and landscapes graced the front windows of The ILC. He was also invited to do an exhibit at the Malden Access Television Art Gallery.

As a pre-school child in China, Minghuan loved to draw, but his parents had no money to buy art supplies. So using small stones, he drew pictures on the road near his home. Neighbors looked forward to seeing what new drawings would appear on the road each day. Minghuan graduated college in 1987 and continued to study at the College of Art in Guangzhou, China, through 1989. In 2010 he drew a giant mural (300 square meters) for the Sri Lanka Pavilion as part of the Shanghai World EXPO 2010.

Minghuan immigrated to Malden in 2011. He came to The ILC to learn English so he could continue his career as an artist in the U.S. People told him that he couldn't be an artist in America because he didn't know English. He was advised to get a job and forget about making a living through his art. That is when he was inspired to go to Harvard Square and the Boston Common to sketch people. He enjoys being able to sketch a diversity of faces in America and he does 15 sketches a day.

He also shares his love of art by teaching drawing at a Chinese learning center on Sundays and to young children two days a week.

Minghuang hopes to leverage the attention he gained through *Window Arts Malden* and his improved English into a career as an artist in America.

Lessons learned at The ILC translate into valuable job skills

The management of a local Dunkin' Donuts franchise decided they wanted to hire more ILC students when they realized some of their best workers studied English at The ILC.

The recruiter contacted the school, and The Immigrant Learning Center's counseling staff arranged for her to come in and meet with students last fall. ILC counselors routinely help students with job fairs and applications, but this was the first time a job fair came to us.

Forty-five students had the chance to practice completing an application and speaking with the recruiter in English. Five lucky students were called in for interviews and hired!

Thanks to your generosity, 913 immigrants and refugees were served during fiscal year 2014 (July 2013 through June 2014).


