

Study Guide for Form N-400, Part 9, Application for Naturalization

Edition 04/01/24

The N-400 form is the application for naturalization. Naturalization is the process of becoming a U.S. citizen if you were born outside of the United States.

This study guide will help you understand the questions in part 9 of the application form.

- The column on the left has the official N-400 question as it appears on the N-400 form.
- The column on the right repeats the question in simple English (highlighted in yellow).
